[How to use Messages in iOS 10, from special effects to iMessage apps](#)

Thanks to iOS 10, your Messages app is way more than a texting app. Way, way more. Now that the official release of iOS 10 is out, here's your guide to using all the new features in Messages, from sending fullscreen effects to installing your third-party iMessage apps from your favorite services like Venmo, ESPN, and OpenTable.

The first thing you should know is that the recipient of your messages will need an iPhone, iPod, or iPad running iOS 10, an Apple Watch running watchOS 3, or a Mac running macOS Sierra in order to view them in their full visual glory. Furthermore, these features are exclusively linked to iMessage, so Android users will have a hard time deciphering the animations as well. For

users on Android or running a previous version of iOS, these messages will show up as regular text with a description of what the visual should have been, like “(sent with fireworks).” Not nearly as capitivating.

Send bubble and fullscreen effects

After typing your message, press and hold down on the blue up–arrow to the right of the input field. That takes you a “send with effect” page where you can slide up to select your text to appear as “Gentle” like a whisper, “Loud” as if you’re yelling, or “Slam” down on the screen. Here, you can also choose “Invisible Ink” to send a hidden message or photo that the recipient can reveal by swiping away pretend particles.

At the top of the screen you can tap to go from these bubble effects to fullscreen effects. Swipe to see all your options, like sending your message with balloons, confetti, lasers, fireworks, or shooting stars. The effects appear for a few seconds when the recipient opens the message. Lasers, fireworks, and shooting star also come with sounds, because how can anyone take a fireworks show seriously without the bursting sounds? After you’ve selected an effect, you can press the blue up–arrow again to send it or the x to cancel. You can also also “Tap Back” on any message, either sent or received, by pressing down on it and placing a heart, a thumbs–up, or a “ha ha.”

If you’re having issues seeing bubble, fullscreen, or Tap Back effects, it’s most likely that you’ve enabled “Reduce Motion” to keep from getting motion sickness from iOS visualizations. To disable this option and try these effects, go to Settings -> Accessibility.

Famous People from American History

William Randolph Hearst

Publisher

Born: 29 April 1863

Died: 14 August 1951

Birthplace: San Francisco, California

Best known as: Founder of the Hearst newspaper chain

The son of a U.S. senator, William Randolph Hearst was a rich kid in his early 20s when he inherited control of the San Francisco Examiner newspaper from his father, mining tycoon George Hearst, in 1887. Hearst went on to build a publishing empire that included newspapers, magazines, news services, radio

stations and film studios. He was an unabashed practitioner of "yellow journalism," and his enthusiasm for sensationalism and his autocratic rule were legendary; he is often accused of nudging the U.S. into the Spanish-American war of 1898, just to sell more newspapers. Beginning in the 1920s, Hearst had a mansion built in central California, called San Simeon but also known as Hearst Castle. He was famously involved in an affair with actress Marion Davies, as well as a public feud with Orson Welles over the film Citizen Kane (1941), which was a thinly-veiled criticism of Hearst.

Hearst was the grandfather of notorious kidnap victim Patty Hearst (he died before she was born)... One famous anecdote has artist/correspondent Frederic Remington writing to Hearst from a peaceful Cuba in 1898, asking to come home. Hearst wrote back: "Please remain. You furnish the pictures and I'll furnish the war."
